


Girlguiding Hertfordshire Platinum Jubilee Celebrations Pack

- Street Party

- Make union flags
 - A template to create a Union Jack from flags of Scotland, Northern Ireland and England.
 - Cut out template, colour in and fold.
 - Colour in both sides of red elements and fold backwards to show separate flags.
 - Can be used to show symmetry, discuss British values and Art or just for fun.

- Make bunting
 - [See template at the back of pack]
 - You will need:
 - Printer, A4 paper (you need one piece for one triangle),
 Scissors, Glue, Something to string the triangle on to,
 Something to hold the bunting securely in place when up (or leave enough string at either end to securely tie up)
 - To make the bunting:
 - Print out as many triangles as you need to make the desire length of bunting
 - Cut out each shape
 - Fold the paper back along the dotted line (so the tab is sitting behind the coloured side)
 - Glue or stick the tab down you don't want to glue the entire tab because you need a space to thread the ribbon or string through to hang the bunting

 If you want the triangles to be spaced apart, you can fold the tab over the ribbon/string and glue the triangle in place on the strand













- Bunting safety
 - Be mindful of where and how securely you hang your bunting as it could be a strangulation/choking hazard. It's not safe to have it anywhere it could be reached by a young child (even by them climbing onto furniture). Make sure it is securely tied or tacked up - you don't want it falling down and becoming within reach of a child, and ensure there are no dangling ends of string or ribbon for an eager child to grab.
 - Of course, if you want to avoid lengths of string or ribbon entirely, you can just print out the triangles, cut off the foldover tab and stick on the wall individually, with pointed edges touching.
- Union Jack Yarn Heart Garland
 - You will need:
 - Red, white, and blue yarn (light, medium, or bulky weight), Cardboard, Scissors, Pen or pencil, Tape (optional), Yarn needle, Union Jack Yarn Heart Garland Template

- Union Jack Bookmarks
- Create a flower arrangement
 - Out of real or fake
 - Origami or foam flowers
 - Lego

- Be Queen for a Day at a Unit / Division / District Disco:
 - The Queen's Jubilee is the perfect excuse to have a party! Be a Queen for a day and get together with girls in your unit or make new friends with girls in your division or district!
 - Dressed up in your finest royal outfit, you could dance the night away to some Platinum rated hits or play some fun games like:
 - Musical thrones (royal take on musical chairs)
 - The Queen Says (Simon says but make it regal)
 - Pass the platinum parcel (a shiny mystery package fit for a Queen)

Have a Platinum Party!

- Take part in the Guinness World Record Country Dancing attempt
- Host an Afternoon Tea (party) for unit parents or have a cake and tea sale to raise money for a Charity of your choice.
 - Make a selection of traditionally filled finger sandwiches with traditional Victoria sponge cake and a pot of tea.
 - Either sell cups of tea and the sandwiches and slices of cake to raise money for a charity close to the Queen's heart OR host an afternoon tea for the parents/ guardians of the girls in your unit.
 - Decorate the cakes and/or cookies with red white and blue colours for the union jack.
 - Make bunting for the party and table decorations for an afternoon tea. You could host a competition for the best table decoration.
 - Make crowns for the unit to wear during the afternoon tea/party
 - Host some traditional activities at a "traditional" street party such as:
 - Tug of War
 - Quizzes each table (or household) can be a team
 - Raffles and Tombola
 - Hook a Duck (someone's bound to have a paddling pool that would be perfect)
 - Chalk drawings on the road

The Queen will be attending the Epsom Derby as part of her jubilee celebrations. The Queen is very fond of horse racing and horses in

general.

To celebrate the Queen's love of horses you could:

- Learn to light a fire
 - Have a go at lighting a fire. Make sure that you have an adult with you if you are a young person and consider the dangers such as:
 - Have a bucket of water nearby to put out the fire if something goes wrong or to nurse a burn
 - Tie long hair back
 - Don't wear baggy clothing or have chords hanging into the fire
 - Remove any trip hazards near the fire
 - Make sure you are not by overhanging trees or bushes, or long grass
 - Make sure the ground is not very dry grass
 - Keep flammable things away from the fire










- Camp blanket
 - In guiding we get lots of badges for all sorts of reasons: we earn them for completing challenges, we have celebrations badges and we have friendship and group badges. A popular idea is to sew badges onto a blanket which is then used to keep you warm at a camp or a campfire. Do you have a camp blanket? Have you got a pile of badges that are waiting to be sewn on? Why not start a camp blanket?
 - GET INVOLVED Share photos of your blanket or tell us about your favourite badge: where did you get it? why? why do you love it so much?



This part of the badge includes different ways you can celebrate the jubilee wherever your interests lie.

- Plan or hold a Jubilee parade for the Queen.

- If you are joining in a local parade or are planning your own use the Girlguiding checklist below to help.
 - Planning checklist;
 - Do a risk assessment for the activity elements you're responsible for with your unit leadership team. Update this as and when things change. Review with any qualified adults on the day.
 - Check out the guidance on joint activities if you are involving other organisations.
 - Organise your leadership team to make sure you have the right ratio of girls to leaders for the section(s) you are doing the activity with.
 - If the activity is outdoors, check the weather forecast for the day and the day before. Review the risk assessment and change plans if needed. Involve any qualified adults if not running it yourself.

- Make sure all clothing/footwear worn is suitable and in good condition. Check with your venue and/or qualified adults if appropriate. Let people know if they need to bring anything else.
- Make sure you have consent from parents and carers.
- Make sure you have first aid cover.
- For activities not marked as adventurous, follow the Health, safety and welfare policy.
- Coding
 - Write some code on the computer to demonstrate following instructions.
 - You might make a Queen/ soldier figure and create your own parade using your skills.

- Take a look at the Guide web safe code to make sure that you browse the internet safely
 - Make sure that you only use social networking websites that are designed for your age.
 - Only accept friends that you actually know on social networking websites.
 - Don't publish or give out any of your personal details, like your address or mobile number.
 - \circ Always ask permission before uploading photos or videos online.



- If someone online is upsetting you, you can block contacts and report that someone that is making you feel uncomfortable.
- Be wary of emails that contain unknown links, clicking the links can download viruses or other harmful files onto your devices. Check with an adult first if you are unsure.
- If you send pictures, be aware that these can be forwarded onto others.
- Remember that online friends are really strangers no matter how long you have been talking to them or how friendly they seem.
 Don't arrange to meet up with anyone you have been chatting to online.
- $\circ\,$ Tell a trusted adult if something online upsets you.

- Planes and Flying
 - It is quite common for a flypast from either the Red Arrows or historical planes to celebrate a royal event. There are 3 challenges below you might want to have a go at.

Cakes


Make a birthday cake and decorate it with the Queen in mind - you could run a family or unit competition.



- Research the Queen's Reign
 - Queen Elizabeth II has had an incredible 70-year reign and that is why we are celebrating her Platinum Jubilee this year.
 - But how much do you really know about the Her Majesty? Take some time to learn more about the Queen and her life so far.
 - As part of your research, you could Create a fact sheet or a poster about the Queen:
 - Add some of your favourite photos of the Queen at different ages or times in her reign.
 - Find some interesting facts about the Queen you may find some great ones in a book from the library, from research online or in a documentary that you have found
 - Learn about where the Queen lives can you find out what are the names of her different palaces and homes?
- Film Night:
 - There are lots of films inspired by the British royal family, why not watch one?
 - Here's some of our top picks:
 - The Queen (PG-13), Young Victoria (PG), The Queen's Corgi (PG), The King's Speech (12)
 - Once you've finished watching your chosen film, you could make a film review about it, you might talk about:
 - What you liked most about it
 - Would you recommend it to your friends, family or unit

 Share a picture of your favourite poster from the film or do a drawing inspired by the film











- Do something for charity:
 - Her Majesty the Queen is a Patron to more than 600 charities and organisations across the UK and the Commonwealth.

 up to become Girl Guides.

- Visit the archive display
- Create a gratitude journal / jar / board:
 - As well as being grateful for everything the Queen has done during her 70-year reign, we can show our appreciation for what makes us smile and happy in our own lives by collecting our 'gratitude' all in one place.
 - There are lots of fun ways you can start collecting your 'gratitude', you could:
 - Upcycle an old jar or container and write something every day that you are grateful for on a slip of paper then add it to your jar - check it at the end of the month to see all the lovely things you can smile about
 - Create a journal write down the days of the week and add in something you're grateful for under every day. At the end of the week or month, spend a few minutes to remind yourself about the lovely things you appreciate but may forget about!
 Start a gratitude board whether it is at home or at your unit, with some post it notes, ask everyone to write down what they're grateful for on their own note and stick them all together in one place. You could do this daily if you're at home or ask your leader if you can do one every meeting for a month!







 Collecting your 'gratitude' can help to increase your positivity, improve your self-esteem, take some time out of your day away from stresses and may even help you to sleep better.







